

THE FILM: What happens when non-violent leaders are pushed to support armed struggle against a brutal regime in a forgotten war? *Thabyay: Creative Resistance in Myanmar* dramatically explores this question. After a military coup crushes democratic change in Myanmar and plunges the country into civil war, two peace activists choose different paths in their attempts to end dictatorship.Maung Saungkha—a poet—takes up arms in the jungle while Thet Swe Win—a community organizer—relocates to a border town in Thailand to amplify the anti-fascist revolution through political organizing. During cross-border forays into conflict areas, our team has captured unrivaled footage illustrating the daily challenges faced by both men.

Along the way, we learn just how critical their work is.

The worsening crisis in Myanmar has slid out of the world's headlines precisely at the time when attention is needed most. Facing daily atrocities at the hands of a military unhinged to attack any civilians who stand in their way, the Burmese people urgently need someone to tell their story. Into this breach steps the film makers of Thabyay. Telling those stories is critically important, and deserves to be supported.

WHY THIS FILM: Myanmar's political crisis has faded from the headlines. This David versus Goliath revolution between pro-democracy forces using outdated weapons and hand-made drones against a military deploying Russian jet fighters and heavy artillery against civilians has swept the country.

Since the military coup in 2021, 1.4 million refugees have been internally displaced by conflict, 6400 political prisoners are currently detained, and tens of thousands of villages have been torched by junta soldiers.

The same junta charged with genocide against the Rohingya is committing war crimes with impunity. For the first time, the country is united in seeing that the military, which many believed was the nation's paternal protector, has divided its people with racist propaganda, attempted to exterminate the Rohingya, and oppressed ethnic nationalities.

The majority Burmans have awoken and have aligned themselves with ethnic armies to fight a revolution they believe will finally oust one of the world's most brutal regimes. With no international support, the ingenuity of Myanmar's people to redirect history from half a century of horror and fear to a future built on peace and justice, is a story that must be told.

IMPACT: Our films portray human rights defenders working at great risk to build just societies. Kirana films are created to spark informed discussion and to give a platform for human rights defenders to speak at screening events around the world.

"I use filmmaking to transform the compassion viewers feel for characters in our stories into action in support of human rights.
